Grandparents and Special Persons day





Negative Responses


- Maths is perceived as:

 - o Dislike of tools (e.g., whiteboards) or topics (e.g., times tables)

This feedback allows us to look at how we create lessons in the future that engage and motivate students.

One of the most exciting and proud moments for our community was when the Dhudhuroa and Way Wurru Circle presented at the conference. It was a fantastic opportunity to share the ongoing Dhudhuroa language journey and to highlight the vital language work being done across our region. Thaedra, Megan, and Bill delivered an outstanding presentation about language awakening, sharing stories, songs, and magical moments that brought language to life for everyone in the room. Their presentation was not only informative but also inspiring.

A particularly memorable aspect of their presentation was the discussion about the next steps and goals for the language project. Hearing about their clear vision and strong sense of direction was exciting and motivating, as it sets out a positive path for the future and encourages everyone to continue working together.
